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Este curso incorpora el servicio a la comunidad latina de Nueva Orleans, lecturas y filmes sobre los problemas de ser inmigrante —en particular en el mundo hispanoparlante—, discusión en clase sobre estos temas y composiciones breves para reflexionar sobre todo esto.

La nota de esta clase consiste en lo siguiente:

- 25% Servicio obligatorio, 20 horas:
Service Learning Goal: Students will read about problems immigrants face in essays, literary works, and film and compare these to the real situations they encounter working with the immigrant community in New Orleans to reach a more in-depth understanding of the issues faced.
- 25% Participación en clase (lo cual incluye asistencia a clase y preparación)
- 30% Composiciones, tareas escritas
- 20% Examen Final

Metas de la clase:

- Improve or attain reading proficiency in Spanish, particularly in contemporary texts in Spanish
- Understand, summarize, and explain in detail complex ideas and advanced linguistic structures in Spanish
- Discuss and analyze concrete sections of the works read and abstract ideas about them and the socio-historical context of immigrants today
- Widen the range of cultural proficiency about contemporary Spain, Latin America, and Latinos in the U.S.
- Discuss and analyze in oral and written form some of the problems of immigrants as shown through film and literature
- Improve writing proficiency in Spanish, including grammar and vocabulary, syntax and use of advanced-level structures to explain and analyze abstract concepts and support arguments appropriately
- Improve speaking and listening proficiency in informal in-class settings

Ausencias:

Cada estudiante puede tener hasta 2 ausencias sin afectar la nota de esta clase. Más de 2 ausencias (excusadas o no) afectarán la nota de participación. NO ACEPTO tareas después de la fecha indicada si no vienen acompañadas por una excusa médica. Sólo con excusa permito "make-up" de trabajo de clase. El/La estudiante tiene que hablar conmigo, antes de la próxima clase si es posible, para discutir el problema y arreglar una hora para recuperar la tarea.
